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








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Please Don't Feed the Meter Past the Time Limit

Parking meters and time limits are used to encourage turnover, allowing more people access to high-demand parking spaces.

State and city parking laws protect public safety and advance policy goals such as ensuring parking turnover so that customers can access stores.

Los Angeles Municipal Code 88.13(b) provides that is unlawful for any vehicle to remain in any parking meter space for more than the time indicated by the posted signs. This ordinance is not a new law and has been enforced by LAPD and LADOT officers for many years. The intent of this law is to help ensure there is "turnover" of a parking space and also recognition that there are a limited number of available parking spaces for a growing demand from motorists.
