Pursuant to Local Rule 83-1.3 and the order of the court issued at the Scheduling Conference conducted in this action on September 12, 2016 before the Honorable John A. Kronstadt, Plaintiffs file this Notice of Related Case.

In the course of preparing the Joint Rule 26 report, Plaintiffs were made aware by counsel for the Defendant City of two other lawsuits arising from the same protest, although those incidents occurred at a different location from the arrests and detentions at issue in this action. Those cases are *Belay and Ahmed vs*. *City of Los Angeles* CV16-01187 JAK(GJSx) and *Amha v. City of Los Angeles*, CV 16-0216 FMO(AFM). The first case filed was assigned to the calendar of the Honorable Fernando Olguin.

The cases all arise out of a series of protests that took place over several days in late November 2016, all related to the grand jury decision not to recommend prosecution of the officer involved in the death of Michael Brown in Ferguson, Missouri. Each case challenges the policies of the Los Angeles Police Department in responding to spontaneous protests and the adequacy of dispersal orders once a decision is made by the LAPD to declare an unlawful assembly. This issue has been the subject of past litigation and incorporated into a Structural Relief Agreement entered by the Court in 3009 in *MIWON v. City of Los Angeles*, cv-07-7032 AHM.

The Chua case involves the detention and arrest of approximately 170 individuals in November, 2014 during these protests. The case is filed as a class action based on two incidents: one occurring at Beverly and Alvarado in which the sub-class was subject to detention, warrantless search and interrogation before being released by Defendants. The second incident involves a mass arrest at 6th and Hope in which Plaintiffs contend that they were not given adequate dispersal notice before being surrounded by the LAPD and arrested. The group at 6th & Hope also contend that they were held in jail for approximately a day when they should have been cited and released pursuant to California Penal Code § 853.6.
Both groups also allege that their privacy rights were violated by the collection of personal information and the storage and dissemination of that information by the LAPD and to other law enforcement entities.

The cases may be related because some of the legal issues are the same, but not all, and some of the defendants are the same, but not all.
